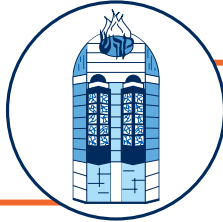

FROM THE RABBI ... Sandford R. Kopnick

ENGAGEMENT

This month, we will say goodbye to our rabbinic intern and our rabbinic fellow, Carolan Glatstein and Eric Mollo. As we do, we will host the Friday night service which precedes the magical morning of Ordination which historically takes place at Plum Street Temple, through the generosity and dedication of Wise Temple.

As these new ordinees are welcomed into the rabbinate, the Jewish world is far different than when I was ordained, 24 years ago. When I was ordained, women were still struggling to be welcomed in top rabbinic positions, the gap between the traditional religiosity of the rabbi and the more classical Reform Jew seemed to be an issue, and many places were most concerned with whether a rabbi would officiate at an intermarriage.

Happily, our movement seems to have outgrown most of this. Women rabbis now outnumber male rabbis in our Cincinnati Reform congregations—with only 2 men and 5 women filling congregational rabbinic positions. Generally, HUC is ordaining fewer rabbis who are far more traditional than most Reform Jews (with noted exceptions). And while there are still many rabbis who do not choose to officiate at intermarriage, the number is far less than in previous generations.

Today's new rabbis have a difficult challenge ahead of them. While we were busy evolving from unfair biases and other responses to modernity, the Jewish world seemed to start straying from participation in synagogue life. The new buzz word is "engagement." While Israel, family connections, new approaches to spirituality, and full equality for women provided new and exciting ways for Jews to find engagement in our faith, today, many are in search of new ways to explore Judaism.

A 25 year old getting married today can far more easily find a rabbi to officiate, has only known a post-intifada Israel, has lived through a significant economic horror, and has seen US troops engaged in active conflict for a significant part of their lives. 1/2 of their lives have had the awareness of The World Trade Center bombing, and issues like abortion rights and equality for the GLBT community are generational, and not really controversial for young people.

So how do these new ordinees engage the new generation? The same way we all do—for it is not a generational challenge. It is up to all of us to follow a few basic ideas: the world is better off with dedicated Jews in it, that Judaism provides a profound structure for

living a meaningful life, and that relationships built in conjunction with Judaism can provide great depth to already wonderful bonds. It is not through Twitter, Facebook, or remarkable creativity that Jews will join synagogues—it is through the warmth of community and a sincere approach to serving God. It may, however, take Facebook, Twitter, and creativity to make timely what remains timelessly relevant.


So good luck to our new ordinees. Thank you for your impact on our congregation, and may God give you the strength not to recreate Torah, but to find the ways to present Torah to those waiting to be engaged. It is terrific work—and I, for one, am honored and renewed at the challenge!

TEMPLE CONFIRMATION /GRADUATION – FRIDAY, MAY 23

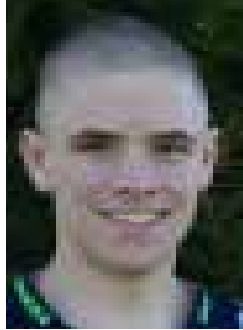

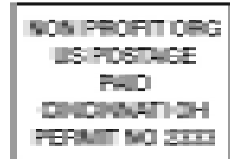
