FROM THE RABBI ... Sandford R. Kopnick

Teaching Judaism in the Temple

Soon after ordination, I had the honor of working with a rabbi who really embodied Jewish teaching. He had a strong vision of our congregation, which included a deep commitment to Shabbat. He taught on many different subjects, and hoped that we would, too. When working with any of the adult education or school-aged classes, whether formal or informal, he would always ask, “what’s Torah about what you’re doing?” Even if I accompanied the youth group on a bowling outing, he hoped that Judaism would be a part of the experience.

Recently, I heard about a rabbi who received a call from a parent who was surprised to hear their child’s views on an issue in the field of medical ethics. When asking their child about the topic, the child indicated that their view had developed from what they heard their rabbi say. The parent was surprised, not just because there was a difference with what the child understood and the parent’s own belief, but because the rabbi had not provided a range of views (including that from the non-Jewish world).

When it comes to many issues regarding medical decisions, especially issues like when to pull the plug, physician assisted suicide, embryonic stem cell research, abortion, and more, Judaism is very clear about when life begins, whether we can hasten death, and the value of saving a life. And while most people are generally surprised at the relatively conservative views of our tradition regarding many of these issues, I am always interested in the way students react—especially when Judaism teaches something different than a popularly held belief.

Every once in a while, I find that I have to remind our families that the Temple’s job is to teach Judaism. Our goal is to be warm and welcoming to as many as we can, and that Judaism—especially Reform Judaism—leaves a lot of room for interpretation. As American Jews, we can elect to allow Judaism to influence our beliefs as much (or as little!) as we choose. My prayer is that what happens in our classes, programs, and in our sanctuary is an honest reflection of a sincere interpretation about what the tradition teaches.

That rabbi who was confronted by that parent calmly reminded the parent that a synagogue’s role is to represent Judaism. When I have had this conversation, my goal is to also add that we should not disparage other faith traditions. Rather I hope to help our students (of all ages) to view Judaism through the modern Reform Jewish prism. Certainly there will be moments when someone’s view is contrary to my understanding of Judaism. This is fine, too. As with most things, respecting a difference is very important—but it is important that we all understand that it is OK to show Judaism to each other, even when it is contrary to what we value.

And, by the way, when we celebrate Purim this month—this entire philosophy gets a 24-hour reprieve.

WHAT'S HAPPENING IN Religious School?

Imagine if your children's school experience were condensed to less than two weeks time. How well could they get to know their classmates and teachers? What kind of interaction would they have with the content? This year we have 26 Sunday sessions of Religious School. At 2 hours and 15 minutes per session, that adds up to around 60 hours. TOTAL. That's equivalent to about 8 secular school days. I find that to be mind-boggling. How can we hope to build a community, instill Jewish pride, learn about holidays, history and customs, and facilitate Jewish identity-building in this short time?

Part of the answer is certainly RETREATS! Early in 2017, two groups of our students had the opportunity to learn and grow together in unique programming that takes them out of the Sunday-morning model to explore Judaism and gives them a chance to spend (a lot of) time together... a time that we, as educators have found to be unmatched.

The Valley Temple Mitzvah Corps (VTMC) traveled to Chicago with Rabbi Kopnick, their teachers David Reinhart and Rachel Stewart, their *madrichah* Alex Woosley and our community Israeli emissaries Alon Peretz and Hadas Silver. The full participation from the students (100% attendance) meant that this community of learners had a chance to build something we cannot accomplish on Sunday mornings alone. The van ride, Shabbat services and meals, educational programming in museums, the hotel swimming pool, and evening outings provide the varied settings for learning and laughter.

Our 4th, 5th and 6th grades had a successful Shabbaton (a day of programming and learning on Shabbat) with fantastic participation (2/3 of the group) during which we attended Shabbat services and studied *Parshat Bo* (that week's Torah portion). The educational programming included a game show that helped us learn terms from the Passover *haggadah*, a text discussion about the last words we say in a seder, "Next Year in Jerusalem," an art project, and a fantastic *matzah*-making activity led by the incomparable Clare Deutsch. We ate lunch together and also spent some time at Splash Cincinnati (an indoor water park). I believe this Shabbaton helped enhance the learning community and friendships among the students. They were able to learn and interact with the Torah portion in a different way than we can on Sunday mornings and they also spent time together



outside of the Temple

Taking the leap to an overnight retreat will only enhance the group's cohesiveness and curricular goals.

Rabbi Kopnick and I highly value retreats as a part of the Religious School curriculum because they give us an additional 48 hours together as a learning community. We all have the opportunity to get to know each other in a different way as we share the van ride, laughing and listening to music, share meals, participate in smaller worship services designed with each retreat's specific theme in mind, play games, make art, explore new places, study text, have discussions, and solidify our relationships.

Our tradition is full of reverence for and commandments to study, especially as a community. It is my hope that the next time we are loading a van for one of our overnight retreat adventures, and it is your child's turn to participate, that you will let us know if you have any questions or concerns and then encourage your child to join the fun!


