#### WHO SAYS JEWS DON'T...

Tuesdays, June 23 & 30 7:30 p.m.

Traditionally when we think of prominent professions that attract many Jews we think of law, medicine, academia, banking; however, there are many prominent Jews who have excelled in less "Jewish" fields such as farming, military service, bootlegging, and more. "Who Says Jews Don't" will look into the less known stories of outstanding Jews who excelled in traditionally non-Jewish careers.

## SO YOU THINK IT'S IN THE TORAH?

We may have grown up hearing the story of Abraham in his father's idol shop furious with the fact that his father sold idols and taking matters into his own hands to smash them. Stories like this may be so ingrained in our memory of Sunday School or schul that we might not even consider their source. We know the story, but where can we find it? "So You Think It's In The Torah" will look at some of the most prominent and well know Midrashim that you may have heard growing up. We will trace the source of these popular Midrashim and investigate how they became so embedded in our Jewish knowledge.



## FROM THE RABBI... Sandford R. Kopnick

Why should I wear a mask? They are uncomfortable and make my glasses steam up. Why should I? What does Judaism teach about us putting on a mask? Here are some ideas from our tradition that inform me to don the mask, even though I would rather not:

A. "To save a life as if you've saved the entire world." (Talmud)

B. "Thou Shalt not murder." (Ten Commandments)

C. "Love your neighbor as yourself." (Leviticus 19:18)

D. "It wouldn't kill you to think of someone else for a change." (Fern Kopnick z"l)

It is true that masks are not mandated as law, but the custom should be employed whenever you are out and about. When you're among folks with whom you have not sheltered, you are at more risk, and so are they. So wear a mask.

But it brings up another question, are we our brother's and sister's keeper? Are we really responsible one for the other? I hope your answer is yes. Truth be told, it seems we have strayed from this idea before this virus has hit.

These last few months of sacrifices were significant. The virus robbed our graduates of commencement, our new rabbis of Ordination, mourners of funerals and shivas, and postponed weddings and *bnai mitzvah*, just to name a few. We have seen summer camp canceled and incalculable job losses. All of this was not to eradicate the virus, but to level the curve to allow those infected to be treated, and to give us time to learn how to live with the virus, rather than accelerate its spread.

While it is alarming that some find this to be a hoax, or that they are not at high enough risk to follow the guidelines Governor DeWine and Dr. Acton have issued, there are always a few.

We are expected to honor our parents (especially the elderly), to care about each other and to protect the common good. So when it is appropriate—wear a mask. And when you think it is not necessary—verify, think again, and be sure that your bare face is at least six feet away from everyone. This new normal isn't great—but it is needed to keep people as healthy as possible.

Have a great month! I'm gong to miss summer camp for the first time in 42 years—as it should be.

# PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT

This proposal was written specifically for Emergency Measures during catastrophic situations. Covid-19 brought forth the issue that played a role in the Board of Trustees' ability to function within the code's parameters. Quite simply, the board was not allowed to vote electronically, as currently, all voting is required in person. This proposal is to update the Code of Regulations, the by-laws of The Valley Temple. It is extremely important that it is understood that this does not change the requirement of the Board meeting in person under normal circumstances. This Proposed Amendment will allow for electronic voting during catastrophic situations only. Your vote is needed, in person on June 28, 2020 during the annual meeting in order for this proposal to be accepted and the Code of Regulations updated.

#### **Article XXIV: Emergency Measures**

Section 1. Attendance at all meetings prescribed in these Regulations must be in person unless an exception applies under this Article or Article IX.

Section 2. In the event of an emergency which, for purposes of these Regulations, is defined as a catastrophic event including, but not limited to, war, fire, pandemic, tornado, flood, or severe snow storm, preventing a quorum of the Board from being assembled in person, the emergency provisions in Section 3 shall become and remain effective until such time as it is safe and practicable for a normally constituted Board to resume in-person meetings.

Section 3. Pursuant to Section 2, any Trustee may participate in a meeting of the Board by means of a telephone conference, video conference, or similar communications equipment. Participation by such means shall constitute presence in person at a meeting provided that all persons participating in the meeting can hear each other at the same time and each Trustee can participate in all matters before the Board, including, without limitation, the ability to propose, object to, and vote upon a specific action to be taken by the Board.

Section 4. In the event of an emergency as defined in Section 2, the Board may vote to hold the annual meeting or special meetings of the Congregation using the remote procedures set forth in Section 3.
