FROM THE RABBI... Sandford R. Kopnick

Again, with the High Holy Days....

We Jews check in on various values on a yearly basis. When we suffer a loss, we observe a yahrtzeit on the anniversary of a death—and, hopefully, can see how we've progressed in our mourning since the intensity of our emotions at the time of our loss. At Passover, we check in on our freedom, our faith, and even the cleanliness of our home, as we prepare for and observe the festival of our freedom. And on the High Holy Days, we are asked to review our year, and see where we have done well, and where we have fallen short.

The last few years, the Covid-19 situation has clouded our annual review. When we are supposed to be filled in self-reflection, some of us found ourselves simply wondering if connecting with our community in-person at Valley was going to be too risky. Rather than being introspective, we may have been self-conscious about masking, keeping the proper distance, and more. It is time to get back to observing the holidays more intentionally.

Rosh Hashanah celebrates our Jewish new year. We reflect on whether we have been present for our community, our families, and ourselves. We reflect on what we can celebrate and what we can improve. We begin the process of reflection so that we can make Yom Kippur meaningful.

Yom Kippur, our Day of Atonement, allows us to access our liturgy which highlights God's role as Judge and Arbiter. While this is not (by any stretch) all that God is, we seek to connect with our Creator and determine which of the Commandments we've embraced, which we've appropriately determined irrelevant, and which we've simply ignored. We also seek forgiveness for sins which we committed, whether on purpose or unintentionally. And while Yom Kippur doesn't substitute for actual repentance for sins done between ourselves and other people, the power of the day can help us move forward for errors of judgement that made us feel we "dialed it in," or were not the best versions of ourselves. We embrace Yom Kippur as a time to retool, re-energize, and move forward from the excuses that kept us at home rather than engaged and involved.

It is time we see each other. Some of you are appropriately going to continue to join us online—for your health warrants continued vigilance. However, for those who find it "easier" to cook dinner and watch services, or not make the 20 minute drive, or have scheduled some non-High Holy Day appointment too close to the time of services, please consider breaking this habit, and rejoining our community. In fact, bring friends.

I hope that you are as vaccinated as you're able to be. I hope you're as intentional as your health demands, and I hope you're as careful as you can be. And I hope you're here.

I look forward to seeing you for our annual check-in. Remember, it's not that you come once a year to Temple, it is that you take this season as your annual review, reset, and push to improve. When we do it together, the energy helps.

RABBI/EDUCATOR'S MESSAGE Austin Zoot

This past week, a group from our Religious School went to the Pixar exhibit at the Cincinnati Museum Center to kick off our Family Education curriculum for the year. The exhibit is amazing; we got to see all of the different people who go into making a Pixar movie, from the writers and actors who get our attention most of the



time, to the designers, artists, mathematicians, computer scientists, physicists, hairdressers, and more who go into the making of the final product. So many human hours of investment, and dedication go into creating the 90 minute film we watch in the theater, and it was so cool to get to pull back the curtain and see how that magic happens.

Of course, the reasonable question is: why did our Religious School go to this exhibit? It is certainly a cool experience, but what does it have to do with Judaism? Well, the beauty of our congregation and our religion is that, just like a Pixar movie, there are so many unique characters who come together to create our beautiful community. It is one of the things I love most about the Valley Temple: each of us brings a unique set of skills, a unique personality, that helps to make us the best version of ourselves. We wouldn't be this incredible family without the kindness and compassion and thoughtfulness and logistics management and knowledge and wisdom that everyone provides.

Like the movies, Judaism is all about taking what makes us each special and building a shared story that helps to move us forward. Everyone comes together in that shared narrative, in order to understand what it is that we are doing. I love to have the Valley Temple Religious School Mission Statement on my desk, and I keep it in mind as often as I can. Because our mission is, in short, to help our students "weave Jewish ideals into the rest of their lives." The Pixar exhibit helped to demonstrate what it looks like to take all of our unique talents and interests and compile them together to create a rope of strands. We help to weave that rope into a lifeline that can help our families navigate a world that is constantly changing and evolving. Just as Pixar movies take the life that we live and explore it from different angles, using different characters and situations to help us understand ourselves and what we care about, so too can the language of our people help to guide us as we navigate the complexities of life.

Throughout this year, we will be using Pixar as a way to explore important conversations within the family encounter with our tradition. We will get the chance to talk about how

to tell a story in short clips and quotes. We will watch a movie that helps us to process the big dreams we have in life and the ultimate purpose of our time on earth. And we will explore how emotions and prayer help us to process what we encounter on our way. It should be an exciting, relatable, accessible way of framing our sacred work: coming together to make meaning and build connection in a place that makes us feel safe and loved.

May this start of our educational year bring us wisdom, creativity, and a desire to continue to grow into the best version of ourselves.

Hello to all!

Every year I think, "I am going to use the High Holidays as an opportunity to consider the previous year, to suss out what I think I did well, what brought joy to others and myself, and take a hard look at where I failed. I am going to read sources on how to enhance the High Holiday experience. I am going to pray and consider. I am going to think and do Jewishly."

And then what do I do? – I go to work, I eat dinner, I watch too much useless television. Then it's Erev Rosh Hashanah and I haven't done any of the life-enhancing things I planned to do. Time for Jewish guilt.

- · Honor the Sabbath. Rosh Hashanah starts the evening of Sunday, September 25. Take the Sabbath before as a day to detach. Have dinner with the family. Find a Sabbath activity that's meaningful to you.
- Count your blessings. You may have engaged in this activity earlier this year based on a mailing from the Temple. What better way to start the year 5783 than with a considered exercise in gratitude.
- · Check if any pre-Covid dress clothes fit. Enough said.

I hope we all can gather together in the Sanctuary this year and reconnect. And I hope you find ways to connect with the spirit of the High Holidays in ways that are meaningful to you.




