

Holy Land Anyone?

What are you doing July of 2024? I hope you'll be coming to Israel with me--and members of our congregation--and members of the Cincinnati Jewish Community. Thanks to the generosity of the Cincinnati Jewish Foundation and the Jewish Federation of Cincinnati, we are going to Israel! The next Cincinnati Community Mission to Israel is scheduled for July, 2024. There will be generous subsidies-especially for adults who have never been to Israel. This is your chance!

There are many reasons to go to Israel. I find that folks who are not connected to Israel sometimes have a difficult time understanding why it is important for Israel to exist. Sometimes, these folks don't understand the inherent bias against Israel and the danger that it poses. Sometimes, folks who are not connected to Israel think that the land was stolen from others who have a more legitimate claim to it. A good trip to Israel (which this will be) can clarify many of these issues.

But there is more. When we walk the steps of Abraham and Moses, the Torah and Jewish life has a greater depth. When we visit the Old City of Jerusalem, the Western Wall appears and we begin to understand the grandeur of the ancient Temple, the unbelievable accomplishment in building it (twice), and the focal point it was for early Judaism. When we visit the metropolis of Tel Aviv, we can juxtapose its modernity with many of the ancient spots and archaeological sites that tell Judaism's story. When we visit Massada, we will see the remarkable fortress that kept the Romans at bay for a time, only to have the story concluded with a rare example of martyrdom. When we float in the Dead Sea, we will see the mineral rich marvel--and maybe even clear up a dry skin patch.

We will eat (a lot). Israeli, Yemenite, and other middle eastern delicacies will be offered each day. We will stay in nice hotels, We will celebrate our Reform Judaism as a congregation, while other synagogues celebrate Judaism according to their tradition. We will tour, shop, hike, eat, and get to know each other better. We will deepen our link to our Judaism, our Cincinnati community, and our Valley Temple family. So, nu? It's time!

The dates for the trip are July 7 - 16, 2024. Go to the Jewish Federation of Cincinnati website and find the link for the trip--and see if you can be with us. You may never get the opportunity to travel to Israel for a better price on such a good trip. And the honor is mine to be with our group as the "bus leader." If you have any questions, I look forward to discussing the trip with you.

RABBI/EDUCATOR'S MESSAGE Austin Zoot

It isn't that we are in a postpandemic world exactly. Rather, I think it would be fair to say that we are beyond the point of letting CO-VID-19 get in the way of going about our daily lives. We are back to in-person services, dining in restaurants, and generally going about business as usual, albeit with a different set of priori-



ties we keep in mind when we leave our homes.

But one area of ongoing concern is the mental health consequences of the past two years, especially for the younger members of our community. There are high school students who have had over half their educational experience devastated. 3-year-olds are going to preschool and are encountering other children perhaps for the first time in their lives. At a time in our human development where the world can feel like a constantly changing set of rules, imagine what it must be like to have even the adults steering you through the experience bewildered and overwhelmed.

Our community is incredibly lucky to have the support of Jewish Family Service, an organization that has worked diligently in recent years to create a Teen Mental Health program. This group prioritizes working with congregational leaders who can help to serve as conduits between the resources JFS has to offer and the congregants who need them most. I am in conversation with the facilitators of the program to ensure that we have access to any and all needs that might come up within our community. We have resources to deal with the diagnosis of cognitive disabilities and learning challenges, have the tools to help students who are encountering anxiety, depression, and trauma, and are in a position to tailor the tools to the individual to best meet their needs.

For years, mental health treatment has been stigmatized to the point that far too many were embarrassed to identify their own struggles. The past three years have guaranteed that we have all experienced some kind of trauma, and that we could all benefit from having a space to be able to work through the things that give us a sense of unease and stress. I am incredibly proud of our Jewish community for putting the time and energy into ensuring that mental health is no longer neglected and left in the shadows, instead helping our people to find the best ways to face the challenges of being a human at an incredibly overwhelming time in history.

This issue does not start and end with adolescents. The mental health of all of our Valley community members is a

top priority, and we are here with a long list of resources, including rabbbinic pastoral care, access to mental health referrals, and other similar resources. Judaism has always been the language our people has used to try to make sense of the world around us, and at a time when that task is as difficult as ever, I am proud of and excited for the ways our tradition and our professionals can help guide our people during these trying times. It is far too easy to walk through the world and feel alone and isolated in the tumult. Our commitment at the Valley Temple, regardless of age, is to ensure that you have the compassion, support, and knowledge to be able to confront whatever this moment throws at you, and for you to know with full clarity that you are not alone in your mental health journey.

If you or a loved one needs help getting access to these profoundly valuable tools, please feel free to reach out to me at any time. That is why we are here.




