FROM THE RABBI... Sandford R. Kopnick

Transliteration... Really?

Chanukah is a holiday that brings light in a dark time of the year. *Chanukah* is a time where the theme of rededication permeates and inspires us to double down on our Judaism. *Chanukah* is a time of joy and dreidel. And, sadly, *Chanukah* is a time where the holiday is frequently mispronounced.

I blame Hallmark. When buying a *Chanukah* card, frequently the holiday is spelled "Hannukah." English does not have a letter that makes that guttural "ch" sound, like at the end of "Baruch." Stick with me, here, we're learning together!

Transliteration systems vary. Hebrew has a few letters that make the same sounds. There are two ways to make "k" and "v" sounds, and two ways to make a "ch" sound. Transliteration helps pronounce words, but it also needed to help readers know which letters form the words. So, "K and Q" were used, "v" and "W(!)" were used, and "Ch" and an "h" with a dot under it were used. The "H with the dot under it" is the culprit.

As I write this, there is no way that I can find to put a dot under an "h" on this keyboard. So, the dot was dropped by printers the world over, and, therefore, the holiday of *Chanukah* has been mispronounced ever since. Then, unwitting Jews trying to be kind, sent these poorly spelled cards, party banners, gift tags, and balloons throughout the world.

So, have some milk or put cream in your coffee to help get your "ch" going, and rev up to say it loud and proud: *Chanukah*. We don't say *Barooh atah Adonai*, we say *Baruch atah Adonai*. So, we should say *Chanukah*, not Hannukah. What a public service this has been.

Regardless of whether you change the way you say it, I pray that *Chanukah* will be meaningful to you and yours. I pray that you'll find ways to be generous to those who celebrate more important holidays in December, and ways you'll add light to those who find their paths forward too dark. And I pray that you'll rededicate yourselves to help-ing us and our country build community through the joy of our Jewish heritage.

May God bless us all with a wonderful *Chanukah*, and help us all to get our "ch" back!

RABBI/EDUCATOR'S MESSAGE Austin Zoot

"The Valley Temple Religious School's mission is to develop in each child a positive Jewish identity through the joy of learning together, inspiring all of them to weave Jewish ideals into the rest of their lives."



I keep a piece of paper with this mission statement within arm's reach on my

desk at all times. Because, as we approach the end of the first semester of our program, I am constantly called to remember our reason for being. There are so many targets that we can hit as a school: we can try to teach as much information about Judaism as possible, can offer encounters with rituals, can have a ton of fun. But one of the easiest (and most intimidating) things we can do is grow complacent. It is so easy for us to get stuck in the routine of teaching the same things year in and year out, and allowing our students to get stuck in the monotony of supplemental education.

This is of course not to say that we are growing stale. Quite far from it. Our program, especially in the face of recent challenges brought on by the pandemic, has proven to be resilient, vibrant, and a source of endless joy and celebration. During these past two years, it has been a unique gift to be able to see the great qualities of our school shine through, even when circumstances made so many of our traditions less accessible than ever before.

But as we continue to explore what the future holds, I love the opportunity to constantly re-center to the target. When I read our mission statement, my eyes are drawn to two distinct words.

The first is "positive." This doesn't mean that everything we teach is happy and cozy. It does mean that when we give the gift of Judaism to our learners of all ages, we are obligated to do so in a way that makes their lives better. We owe it to our learners to keep their needs in mind at all times, and to ensure that the things we teach are actually applicable to the lives that they are living. There are plenty of spaces in a person's life that makes them feel obligated, put-upon, condescended, and undervalued. Your synagogue should never be one of those places.


The other striking word to me is "weave." Judaism, when done best, is not something you take off and put on at convenient moments. Rather, it is a part of our identity, something we carry in the very fabric of our identity. This requires that we be fully present and attentive to the needs of our everyday reality. We can't force Judaism into a person's life, nor can we force a person into Judaism. When we are at our best, we are finding ways to integrate the two, to build something that is sustainable and impactful and fluid to the changing circumstances in which we find ourselves.

There are lots of ways to serve our mission statement on a day-to-day basis, and there are a lot of choices to be made. I can't promise that we are always going to make the right decisions, because perfection is not a Jewish value. But I can promise that, as we make decisions, our guiding principles will continually give us the opportunity to ask the right questions, and to constantly remember why it is that we are doing this in the first place. We, at the Valley Temple Religious School in particular and the congregation as a whole, are here to provide a meaningful, positive, and holistic relationship to Judaism and to the sacred, in order that we may be able to give one another the gift of purpose, joy, and love. That's a high bar to clear, but I have plenty of faith in each of us to do great things with great intention.

VALLEY TEMPLE TIKKUN OLAM

There are multiple ways to engage in Tikkun Olam, in ways that reflect our Reform Jewish values.

If you've been in the Valley Temple lobby recently, you may have noticed a large blue barrel. We are collaborating with Sisterhood, to provide monthly donations to community agencies. Each month we will identify a specific agency to collect items for: In November we provided food for our yearly Thanksgiving donations to the Valley Interfaith Community Resource Center. December will be a toy donation for West End Sisters For Life, and January will be diaper donations for families that can't afford diapers for their children, through the "Sweet Cheeks" Diaper Bank of Cincinnati. We have tentative plans for the rest of the 2023 year, so please watch the newsletters and emails for more details and opportunities to be involved.

Valley Temple Sisterhood members and other congregants were deeply engaged in promoting the very Jewish value of voting, having sent out about 750 postcards for the "Every Voice, Every Vote" campaign of the Religious Action Center (RAC) and the Center for Common Ground/ Reclaim Our Vote. We will continue to work with RAC/URJ on state and national Social/ Racial justice priorities, including the No Death Penalty Ohio campaign; encouraging Congress to permanently expand the Child Tax Credit; addressing Racism, Homophobia, Ableism and more in our communities; and other issues as they arise.

First Candle: Sunday, December 18

Candles are added to the *Chanukiyah (menorah)* from right to left, and are kindled left to right. The newest candle is lit first.

On the *Shabbat* of *Chanukah*, kindle the *Chanukah* lights first, and then the *Shabbat* candles.

Light the shamash (helper candle) first, using it to kindle the rest of the Chanukah lights. As you do, say or sing:

Baruch Atah, Adonai Eloheinu, Melech haolam, asher kid'shanu b'mitzvotav v'tsivanu l'hadlik nehr shel Chanukah.

Blessed are you, Adonai our God, Sovereign of all, who hallows us with mitzvot, commanding us to kindle the Chanukah lights.

On the first night only
