## FROM THE RABBI... Sandford R. Kopnick

#### **EXPERIENCES MATTER**

I am worried. The last few years moved us to the internet to further our relationships in a way that was necessary, but troublesome. Thank God for the technology that allowed us to Zoom and stream with each other while we isolated. Our attempts to keep each other healthy led to isolation, limited opportunities for social interaction, and significant limitations for personal growth.

Some folks are reluctant to rejoin their previous in-person lives. Temple members who stream our services are still at a higher number than before the pandemic, and many folks prefer to connect virtually for meetings and adult learning.

Thankfully, we are seeing a post-Covid bounce in our membership, adding a few more this year than we did the year before the pandemic. We are also returning to the experiential learning for our children, allowing Temple sponsored travel for our middle school and high school students.

Our students connect better when they are together. The time in the van or on the plane make life-long memories. The informal times and discussion that occur when we are sharing a meal, sitting at services in a new place or discussing Creation at the Adler Planetarium help create the relationships that keep our community together.

The times in Washington, D.C. when we learn about social justice, share our experience together at the Holocaust Museum, or stroll around the museums of the Smithsonian, all deepen our connection to our Judaism and our community.

That's among the reasons I hope you'll come to Israel in July, 2024.

If your health keeps you from being present—or if you're out of town—no problem. That's why we have the streaming. If, however, you've gotten used to not being present, we need your physical presence to help keep things dynamic.

We are taught in our tradition "to not separate yourself from the community." While I'm proud that our streaming is more advanced than many congregations our size, it is no substitute to the experience you give Rabbi Zoot and me, and that we can create when we see your face, and the way you react to us and each other. Please engage.

#### **VALLEY TEMPLE TIKKUN OLAM**

We continue to seek donations for the "Blue Bin" in the lobby. In January we supported "Sweet Cheeks", the only Diaper Bank in Greater Cincinnati.

For February are supporting Found House Interfaith Housing Network. This was formerly called Interfaith Hospitality Network but continues with the same mission: "Provides emergency shelter in partnership with interfaith communities to families with no place else to turn, and ongoing housing and supportive services so that homelessness does not recur."

This is an amazing organization, with many wonderful programs, but the one we're collecting donations for this month is their "Pet Support Program". This unique program provides temporary shelter for dogs, cats, and other pets whose owners are in shelters, hospitals, or rehabilitation programs all over the Greater Cincinnati area. While housing these animals they also provide access to vaccines, spay/neuter services, and veterinary care. This provides pet owners an opportunity to access services without having to surrender their beloved "4-legged family members".

Items accepted: dog food & cat food, wet or dry; toys; blankets; and of course, monetary donations.

Donations to the Social Action Fund can be made on the on website and put in comments for Found House.


Found House offers many opportunities to volunteer, including helping care for pets!

# RABBI/EDUCATOR'S MESSAGE Austin Zoot

Sometimes, people have a hard time finding the Valley Temple from Springfield Pike. We are set back far enough from the street that it is far too easy to drive past us and miss the turn. It doesn't help that GPS devices seem to think we're located in our back parking lot, and so whenever I have food delivered to the Tem-



ple, it is always an adventure to help the delivery driver find the way.

So from the street, it would be pretty hard to tell that Tuesday isn't just any other ordinary weeknight at our synagogue. But once you step inside, you can almost feel that something special is going on. Each Tuesday, students of all ages come to the Temple to learn the language of our people. Hebrew School isn't just for middle schoolers preparing for their B'nei Mitzvah. In fact, we have a variety of classes that bring together different levels of learning to decode and interpret letters, prayers, and even biblical chapters.

Funny as it might be, I'm one of the few people NOT studying Hebrew on Tuesday evenings. Which means that I have the unique opportunity to walk around and take in the sacred noise that is going on. It is profound to experience multiple generations coming together to practice Judaism in this intentional, vibrant way. I love seeing the parents who bring a book or a laptop with them to get comfortable in the lobby, and do a little schmoozing

while they're at it. I love the sound of the 5th graders using the letters they had learned the year prior to construct full sentences of prayers, beginning to see the connection between the abstract learning they've been doing and the experience of ritual that is fast approaching. And I love seeing adults take ownership of their Jewish identity in this intimate way, building connections with the language, with their peers, and with the teachers who are just as nourished by the teaching as the students are by the learning.

Hebrew is a very strange language when you think about it. Ancient, Biblical Hebrew has been around for thousands of years, yet as recently as 200 years ago, the language was dying out, becoming as dormant as Latin. But in the 19th century, a scholar named Eliezer Ben Yehuda came along and decided that if Judaism was going to remain viable, accessible, and meaningful for the next generation of Jews, a shared language would be the perfect way to codify our identity as a people. And so, when we gather together on Tuesday nights, we are creating a magical touchpoint between the ancient and the modern, between the traditional and the revolutionary. We gather together each week to do what we have always done as a nation, and yet to meet a very modern, very timely need. I'm writing this on a Tuesday (I don't know what day you're reading it, because that isn't how a bulletin works...) And I'm excited that tonight, the building will be full of people, all with different needs, different skill levels, and different ideas. But we get to come together and learn with one another, from one another in a way that feels electric, if we stop and appreciate the moment. I know I will. And if you ever wonder what beautiful, sacred Jewish community looks like, you're welcome to come enjoy it with me. I'll be here each Tuesday.

#### PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE Jody Finley

On the way into the Temple recently, I was balancing a Torah Commentary, a prayer book and a big box of diapers. Our wonderful *Tikkun Olam* Committee was collecting diapers for Sweet Cheeks, an organization that provides diapers and associated products to families in need.

According to ReformJudism.org, *Tikkun Olam* means to "repair of the world," a Jewish concept that it is our responsibility to partner with God to improve the world." The Valley Temple *Tikkun Olam* Committee takes this responsibility very seriously.

I asked Linda Lazar, committee co-chair, why she has made a commitment to *Tikkun Olam*. "As a Humanist," Linda said, "I've always believed we are 'commanded,' i.e., obligated to work for a fair and just world for everyone, and to protect our planet for future generations. I didn't always recognize it but my passions for this work came in large part from my Reform Jewish upbringing. As a teenager growing up during the Civil rights movement, the anti-war movement and the Women's Rights movement, my sense of right and wrong, and my obligation to work for justice was cemented for life."


