FROM THE RABBI... Sandford R. Kopnick

Recently, I had the pleasure of traveling to Chicago with our middle school kids and to Washington D.C. with some of our high school students. One of the worst parts of the pandemic has been to cancel these trips since 2020. When people ask me what about the Valley Temple is most special, I speak about the relationships, but I especially speak about our kids.

Being a small synagogue, our brand is the personal attention we give to our students when they are in our religious school. Rabbi Zoot has been exceptional in embracing our culture and enhancing this value. The *b'nai mitzvah* program addresses individual learning needs and allows for a huge step forward in becoming a part of the Jewish community as a more educated and more connected emerging adult.

And these trips. Watching our middle school group connect with each other at a large Chicago temple, over dinner at the deli, and by sharing their feelings about God and Creation at the Adler Planetarium was overwhelming. Thanks to the Jewish Foundation of Cincinnati, we were able to elevate the experience so that the kids were safe, wellfed, and happy the entire weekend. Students from many districts connected—some for the first time—with each other—and with Austin, Brian Meeron, and me. Thank God. I didn't realize how much I missed them.

Washington D.C. had us finally come together as high school students. We gathered with hundreds from across the country, but had plenty of time to reconnect with each other, too. Our students are growing into remarkable people, and I love that we could finally reestablish our bond through worship, study, over a few meals, and by having the time to be together. I was inspired to say the *Shehechiyanu* often. Thanks to the Jewish Foundation and the Stark Family Youth Fund, we were able to keep the cost of the trip to each family at a fraction of the real cost, and the experience was one I won't soon forget.

Being with our students reminded me that while I love much of what I do, working with our students and facilitating Jewish experiences gives me a sense of joy and purpose that I always strive for as a rabbi. Many reports show that the interruptions caused by COVID-19 protocols have affected school-aged children and their socialization and growth. Getting back to these trips, the family education that Rabbi Zoot is so talentedly creating, and more will continue to help undo what the pandemic wrought. Thank God.

So, as we approach Purim, allow this serious moment of my gratitude to God for helping us through these last few years. And my gratitude extends, also, to our parents for trusting your kids with us; and to our congregation which upholds our commitment to our children. *Shehechiyanu*, indeed.

RABBI/EDUCATOR'S MESSAGE Austin Zoot

Religious communities are very good at taking themselves seriously. Which might be why so many members of our congregation like to bring guests and loved ones to the Valley Temple Purim celebration.

On the surface, this is a TERRIBLE idea. Because if you want to get a sense for

what Judaism has to offer your life, maybe showing off our weirdest, wildest night isn't the best foot forward. We are particularly irreverent that night, and I can imagine it is hard to take your rabbis seriously when we are wearing Oscar the Grouch trash cans, Blueberry Suits, and the King of Hearts attire. But what is it about Purim that seems to resonate with so many members of our community? Why do we keep bringing our non-Jewish partners to give THIS as our first foot forward?

What makes Purim so special is that it is a time when we name our appreciation for the full spectrum of emotion. In Judaism (like other faiths) we are well practiced at solemnity, seriousness, and gravitas. But there is also something beautifully human about being able to enjoy a good laugh, to not take ourselves so seriously. Purim is that chance to acknowledge that we are whole people, and that it is not only acceptable, but encouraged to be goofy, silly, and steer into the fun.

The Purim story isn't exactly the most sacred text in our Bible. The book of Esther is rife with sexual innuendo, slap-stick comedy, mockery, and tomfoolery. How can we take ourselves too seriously when we are reading the equivalent of a Mad Magazine that got inserted into the Holiest Book in the world? The simple answer is that we don't. We enjoy a festive environment that allows us to embrace the fun of being human, and to enjoy the glow of creating senseless fun with those we love.

If you're trying to show a person in your life why you love Judaism, there are a lot of ways to do that. Yom Kippur expresses the deep spiritual work of trying to find the best version of the self. Passover is one of the most tactile, accessible rituals in our history. And Shavuot makes learning and education a full-day affair. But Purim gives us a alimpse of something that is so often missing when we talk about faith: a love of joy. But joy is central to what we do here at Valley, and is a big part of what makes it so special to be a member of our community. We come by joy pretty easily. Not because we don't take ourselves seriously, or because we aren't prepared to handle the moments when life can be challenging, but rather BECAUSE we need to balance those things with special times of enthusiastic celebration. So I guess, in that way, there is no better time to understand what makes Valley such a wonderful congregation than Purim.


