FROM THE RABBI... Sandford R. Kopnick

Israel at 75

I remember a TV special when Israel turned 25. It concluded with Barbra Streisand singing *Hatikvah*, Israel's national anthem. There was such a feeling that even though Israel had survived war, terrorism, and the profound aggressive hatred of its neighbors, Israel survived. Most of American Judaism's reluctance to embrace Israel's importance to Jewish identity had ceased, and a sense of unifying religious pride in Israel's accomplishments and survival was common. Even though the situation in Israel is so different now that Israel is 75, I find that when I remember my personal relationship with Israel, I am inspired to remember that Israel's existence and on-going importance matters to me, and I hope to you, too.

I remember....

...being in religious school when the music teacher told us about the 1973 *Yom Kippur* War and the worry the "adults" had about whether things were going to be OK.

...I remember the 1972 Munich Olympics, and hearing my grandmother's anger when Jim McKay announced the murder of the Israeli team.

...I remember my first trip to Israel as a high school senior and the relentless recruiting of Israelis from America who wanted nothing more than all of us to "make *Aliyah*" and move to Israel.

...I remember my year in Israel when I began HUC and I thought I asked a bakery owner for "warm doughnuts" (during *Chanukah*) when, in fact, I asked for "wise tomatoes." Later, when I returned and proclaimed that I didn't get what I asked for, we both laughed and he said to me, "had I corrected you, you would have never spoken Hebrew to me again."

...I remember showing a few hundred people over the years Israel for the first time, and their profound reactions to both the spiritual moments we shared, and the heightened awareness of the geography that makes easy solutions to the issues of where everyone in the region lives so difficult.

...I remember the special feeling of purchasing Judaica from *Yad L'kashish*, a remarkable place that allows elderly the dignity of working at their crafts well into retirement, and profiting from the sales of their artistry.

...I remember the horrific behavior of ultra traditional nationalists who shot up a mosque, assassinated Yitzchak Rabin, and provoked Palestinians in ways so very contrary to Jewish values.

...I remember learning about the haven so necessary that it inspired Theodore Herzl, David Ben Gurion, Golda Meir, and so many others to transform their lives in ways that allowed Israel to be established and ultimately become a viable and sustainable country even though the majority of the land was crude and inhospitable to settlement.

...I remember the remarkable Israeli ingenuity that developed agricultural systems, high-tech industry standards, medical advances, and so much more.

...I remember standing at the Western Wall with rabbinic colleagues and celebrating an egalitarian Torah reading together as we struggled for religious rights for the progressive approaches to Judaism.

...and I remember the worry that I live with today, as Israel struggles to figure out how to move forward as a long-es-tablished country with real problems and real possibilities.

And while I pray that Israel's issues will be resolved in ways consistent with how I understand Judaism, today I celebrate the miracle that is still the state of Israel. At the end of World War II, when our people were at our lowest, it was the promise of Israel that allowed us to be revived and move forward. May Israel finds its promise to be more compelling than the immediacy of politics, and return it to a place filled with "hope" for everyone. Next Year in Jerusalem, indeed.

RABBI/EDUCATOR'S MESSAGE Austin Zoot

It may come as a surprise, but May is one of my favorite months in my working calendar. No, it isn't because Religious School is out for the majority of the month (our last day is May 7th). Or, at least not entirely. What I love about the month of May is that we spend it strategizing for the future.



It's hard to make changes to

the school's program during the academic year. Once the bus starts moving, it is awfully hard to slow down long enough to change out the tires. But May allows us enough of a pause to really reflect on what has been successful in the past year, and where we might want to make strategic changes in order to better accomplish our goals. May is the perfect time to daydream about what the next iteration of our school could be, and what steps we need to take to get there.

This year, we returned to full-time in-person learning for the first time since 2020. It was a beautiful return to normalcy, and my first experience actually doing the job I was expecting to do when I signed my contract three years ago. I loved having the chance to find a rhythm with our students, and to begin to do some of the experimenting that made this year such a hit. A few of the highlights from the year include:

- Opening the year at the Cincinnati Museum, exploring the Pixar exhibit and learning about storytelling as a Jewish value.

- Continuing the Pixar encounter with three family education opportunities, including a movie day to watch Soul and an exploration of prayer centering around Inside Out.

- A field trip to the zoo to celebrate the Torah portion talking about Noah, in partnership with Rockdale Temple and Temple Sholom.

- Musicians all year long, from regulars Cyle Ginsburg and Charlene Gubitz, to special guests Dan Nichols and Charlie Blumer.

This is just the tip of the iceberg, not only of the amazing things that happened this year, but the beginning of so many more exciting and interesting ways that we are going to continue to bring Religious School to life. But the greatest highlight for me has been getting to know our students on a deeper level. I love being able to get to know what makes each of your kids unique and interesting, to learn what they love to do and how they see the world. We have the privilege of running a school that is intimate enough for everyone to know everyone, and to truly be able to make every morning feel like a communal experience. This month, I'm excited to think back on all the great things we tried, and all the new things we should try next. And to do that best, I want your help: if you have ideas about how we can do better, please reach out and share them with me. After all, this program is all about deepening relationships and benefiting our students, and who knows how to do that better than the parents who make all of this learning possible. So I look forward to hearing what you've loved, what you want to skip next time, and what you want to see us try in the future. Because this school has been a highlight of our congregation for years, and I'm so fortunate to get to continue stewarding us into a very bright future for our children.
