

From the Rabbi Sandford R. Kopnick

Some ideas about making Chanukah meaningful this year:

As you know, our feast of rededication is called *Chanukah*. The *Bubbe Misa* (grandmother's tale) suggests that the festival is eight days long because of oil that was supposed to last for only one day—and lasted for eight. More likely, it is eight nights because the Festival of *Sukkot* was postponed until the ancient Temple was re-captured, and the first act was to celebrate that festival—showing our thanks for the blessings that are ours.

So let's spend eight days figuring out ways we can count our blessings. Here are some suggestions:

- Volunteer to help gather food for the poor/needy and bring it to the Valley Interfaith Center in Lockland.
- Light the *menorah* each night, finding some *Chanukah* music on-line.
- Zoom or Facetime with family or friends in other cities when you light your Chanukiyah
- Determine as a family that each candle is significant to a Jewish and/or a family value.
- Perhaps you can light the candle for Israel, hope, kindness, tikkun olam, community, education, family, etc.
- Join us as we celebrate Chanukah as a congregation at our annual Chanukah dinner.
- Donate to an NGO helping Israel, the Jewish Federation, or a Jewish cause which you find meaningful.
- Donate to a Soup Kitchen or Food Pantry that helps the homeless.
- Have kids or grandkids donate some used toys or clothes to the Goodwill or Salvation Army and bring the items there together.

When you do something fun, meaningful, or both, send me a picture from your activity or *Chanukah* lighting ceremony so we can use it to share with others.

Rabbi/Educator's Message **Austin Zoot**

It isn't a regular thing that college students ask to chat with me at 9 o'clock at night. But when Jacob texted me as I was putting my child to bed, I was happy to answer the phone. After exchanging pleasantries, Jacob explained the purpose of his call: he had just attended a lesson at Hillel and had heard some things about Judaism that he had never encountered before. He wanted to know how this new information lined up with what he had been taught at camp and in his congregation.

We spent a few minutes unpacking the Kabbalah that the guest educator had explored, and looked at some of the ways the ancient mystical expressions of our tradition differed from the more mainstream Judaism that we generally teach in our more mainstream settings. It was powerful to be able to explain, using terms and prayers and concepts that I knew Jacob was familiar with, to explore how a mystical lens would deepen, morph, and adapt what he knew into something that looked dramatically different. By the end of the call, Jacob seemed like he was able to properly contextualize what he didn't know with what he did, and was at a renewed sense of peace with his Jewish knowledge.

I, meanwhile, couldn't have been more proud of the whole situation. It is a simple reality that there are not enough hours in a human lifetime to teach a young person everything there is to know about Jewish learning, wisdom, and tradition. We can show students the best of what Judaism has to offer and we can teach students how to think about the world around them, but we can't download the entire library onto their mental hard-drives. But what happened with this situation was that Jacob was able to confront something he had never encountered before, and knew where to go to get the help and support that would make the foreign seem a little more accessible. I was incredibly proud that, based on the strong relationship and comfort level that we had developed at camp, Jacob was willing to call me and ask in-depth questions, and know that I was more than happy to fill in the gaps.

Religion is far too often infused with great judgement and condescension. That doesn't help anvone have a safe and healthy relationship with our tradition. Instead. this interaction was proof that when we are willing to treat The Valley Temple ושונותם כבני

exchange of knowledge as a gift rather than a shortcoming, when we see a willingness to learn as far more beautiful than a crime of not knowing in the first place, Judaism has a strong and beautiful future.

Even more beautifully, I can speak from first-hand experience what it is like to be treated with this kind of care. I am where I am in life because the rabbis and educators who came before me were able to answer my questions with love and compassion. Nobody embodies this better than Rabbi Kopnick, who maintains strong and caring partnerships with campers and staff he nurtured over his career. The best gift Judaism can give is this kind of chain of tradition: Sandford has taught me so much, and I am so grateful to get to do the same for Jacob and his peers. And I know that one day, it will be Jacob's turn to pass along that care and love of learning to my children.

Happy Chanukah

First candle: Thursday, December 7th

Candles are added to the *Chanukiyah* (*menorah*) from right to left, and are kindled from left to right. The newest candle is lit first.

On the Shabbat of Chanukah, kindle the Chanukah lights first, and then the Shabbat candles.

Light the *shamash* (helper candle) first, using it to kindle the rest of the *Chanukah* lights. As you do so, say or sing:

בָּרוּךְ אַתָּה יְיָ אֱלֹהֵינוּ מֶלֶךְ הָעוֹלָם, אֲשֶׁר קִדְּשְׁנוּ בִּמִצִוֹתַיו, וִצְנֵנוּ לִהַדְלִיק נֵר שֵׁל חַנְכַּה.

Baruch Atah, Adonai Eloheinu, Melech haolam, asher kid'shanu b'mitzvotav v'tsivanu l'hadlik nehr shel Chanukah.

Blessed are you, Adonai our God, Sovereign of all, who hallows us with mitzvot, commanding us to kindle the Chanukah lights.

בָּרוּךְ אַתָּה יְיָ אֱלֹהֵינוּ מֶלֶךְ הָעוֹלָם, שֶׁעָשָׂה נִפִּים לַאֲבוֹתֵינוּ וְאִמוֹתֵינוּ בַּיָּמִים הָהֵם בַּוִּמֵן הַזֵּה.

Baruch Atah, Adonai Eloheinu, Melech haolam, she-asah nisim laavoteinu v'imoteinu bayamim hahaeim ba-zman hazeh.

Blessed are you, Adonai our God, Sovereign of all, who performed wonderous deeds for our ancestors in days of old at this season.

On the first night only:

בָּרוּךְ אַתָּה יְיָ אֱלֹהֵינוּ מֶלֶךְ הָעוֹלָם, שֶׁהֶחֶיָנוּ וְקִיְּמָנוּ וִהִגִּיעַנוּ לַזִּמֵן הַזֵּה.

Baruch Atah, Adonai Eloheinu, Melech haolam, shehecheyanu v'kiy'manu v'higianu laz'man hazeh.

Blessed are you, Adonai our God, Sovereign of all, for giving us life, for sustaining us, and for enabling us to reach this season.

BLUE BIN DONATIONS

December 2023: "Rosemary's Babies"

Rosemary's Babies was founded in 2013, with the mission of helping teen parents with education, resources and life skills, and "master the concept of self-leadership to leave a legacy." This United Way agency has served thousands of teen parent families, and has been named by Cincy Magazine as the "Best Parent Resource in Pregnancy & Childbirth" 3 years in a row.

This November, they opened "Holloway House", a facility that includes business & educational resources, and a supportive housing center for teen moms and their babies. The items we are collecting for Holloway House are their requests for Learning Items, including: Alarm Clock, Pens, Pencils, Tape, Paper Clips, Scissors, Highlighters, Permanent Markers, Rulers, 3-Hole Punch, Desk Drawer Organizers, Sticky Notes, Notebooks, Calculators, Calendar/Planners, Desk Lamp, Phone Charger, Backpacks

January 2024: "Sweet Cheeks"

This January we will again be requesting donations for Sweet Cheeks, the Diaper Bank for the Greater Cincinnati area. Sweet Cheeks distributes ~ 200,000 / month, ~ 2,000,000 per year - through their partner organizations. Diapers are donated from individuals, businesses,

& community groups. The items needed: Opened and unopened diapers, esp need sizes 4, 5, and 6 but will take any size; New (unopened) wipes; Period products

For these and other donations throughout the year, if delivering to the temple is not convenient, you can send a check to the Valley Temple Social Action fund and we will make sure it goes to the designated agency, or order items through Amazon and have it delivered to the temple.

Our Tikkun Olam committee has ideas for the other months of the year, including climate change actions, LGBTQ+ rights, and others, but we'd love to have more people join us, and bring your ideas and passions!

SOCIAL JUSTICE ACTIVITIES

We work closely with RAC-OH throughout the year, to coordinate advocacy activities, such as letter-writing, calling on legislators, and education related to public policies that have been identified by the Union of Reform Judaism (URJ) and local congregations. While we are gratified that our many months of hard work by us and our coalition partners helped insure the passage of Issue 1 in Ohio. But there are clearly many more struggles ahead, both nationally and in the world, including Israel's war against Hamas, and the rising antisemitism in the US. As more opportunities/ needs for engagement arise, we will be alerting the congregation.
