Coming to terms with a family history of the Holocaust

We figuratively stumble across a memorial and our minds are jogged into remembrance. This evening we'll learn about Ron Weitzenkorn's recent trip to Germany on behalf of his father and uncle (currently in their 90s). WHY I SUPPORT ISRAEL

Hamas has been remarkably successful in their efforts to seriously damage Israel. Gaza is an overcrowded and difficult place. Hamas' rise to power there has made it impossible for Israelis to negotiate for peace. Contrary to popular belief, Hamas has never renounced their goal of the destruction of the state of Israel. And while Israel has not always properly handled the complex situation in which the Palestinians find themselves, they have sought peace through dealing with the adversary without the goal of destroying the other side. There have been some Israeli leaders more sincere in their desire to make peace, but even the current prime minister has negotiated peace with leaders of neighboring countries.

The Hamas attack on *Simchat Torah* is unprecedented, inexcusable, and terrorism. The taking of so many hostages, the bombardment of Israel with thousands of missiles, and the murder of so many Israeli civilians—children and elderly among them, is a provocation that had to be answered.

I support Israel because, with all of its blemishes—it is a haven for our people that few places are. Israel is the historical home of the Jewish people and the destination for thousands and thousands of refugees from various wars, antisemitism, and persecution. And while I might be appalled by the ways Israel's government behaves, I am not at the moment.

I loathe war and the death of innocents. I am fully supportive of destroying the Hamas organization—and pray that it would happen with few civilian casualties.. However, that is impossible given that Hamas warriors and politicians hide among Gazans in hospitals, tunnels, schools, and residences. Israel values human life—and defending themselves includes stopping those who pursue the life of Israelis. That is Israel's right.

I grew up in a Jewish home that was affected in previous generations with persecution which made my ancestors flee their homes and families in search of a better life. I remember the heartbreak my grandmother endured when her Polish family perished in the Holocaust. "Never again" was a serious refrain—and it still is.

I do not believe Israel was created in order to diminish the other peoples who are indigenous to the holy land. And while we did gather some of our exiles from their host countries that were oppressing them, there have always been Jews in Israel. The Palestinians need to resolve that Israel is going to exist—and the Israelis have to resolve that Palestinians are human beings that deserve the dignity for self-determination. However, Hamas is not interested in Israel existing—and they are willing to sacrifice Palestinians to that end. Shameful.


The world is already filled with people who have no problem criticizing Israelis for trying to rid Gaza of Hamas and neu-

tralize the on-going threat of rockets, kidnappings, murder, and terrorism. If Canada were to attack the U.S. in a similar way—is there any doubt what our country would do to insure it never happens again? Can we all remember the lengths the U.S. went to after 9/11 to engage war on terror?

So I proudly state that *Am Yisrael Chai*—the Jewish people lives! I hope you do, too. And I hope that you are giving generously to agencies and charities that support Israel's existence and that help the Israelis survive the anguish and challenges that this latest round has inflicted. And we pray for the peace of Israel—and for peace for Palestinians who are looking to survive and build alongside their Israeli neighbors who would also like the end to hostilities. May God grant peace to the region and to us all, amen.

RABBI/EDUCATOR'S MESSAGE Austin Zoot

As I write this with (barely) enough time to publish it in the bulletin, we are at war. Our people, both in Israel and online, are facing the ongoing and devastating task of defending our right to exist. And, as is far too often the case, the brunt of the trauma falls to our children. Despite our best efforts to keep them safe and sheltered from the harsh realities of our world, moments like this require us



to show them the scarier side of what it means to live in a world of human cruelty.

It has been a challenging several weeks for us to try to process what our children are hearing in the news and how they are making sense of the things going on in our world. But Judaism has always guided us through moments like this. Judaism has helped us to process grief and loss with our children, despite our inability to choose when those conversations need to happen. Our Judaism has provided language for talking about life transitions in many areas, from morality and justice to birth and sickness. And, once again, we need to call upon those lessons in order to try to share with our families how to process a moment in history that is as scary as it is consequential.

In the first weeks after the attack by Hamas against the Israeli south, our religious school students have come to class with questions and concerns. They want to understand why a world that is supposed to be full of kindness and love can also be so hateful and cruel. They want to know why we as Jews are struggling with this in America, thousands of miles from the fighting. And we owe it to them to be honest in an age appropriate manner, to show them what it means to engage healthily in our feelings and to accept the limits of our ability to understand.

It is not an act of weakness to show our children that we are scared. It is not an act of negligence to be incapable of answering every question. But, when adults look back at some of the most defining moments in history that they experienced first-hand, they frequently report that the most meaningful, helpful thing their caretakers could do was to be present with them and validate their feelings, making it ok to not know what to feel or how to process it. The relative ease of pretending everything is alright might be satisfying for the moment, but it does not set up children for long term success when life inevitably throws another curveball.

As we continue to move forward in an uncertain world, we are all here for one another. Parents are there for their children, to help them find a sense of understanding in a world so lacking in it. Our community is here to support parents as they find the right ways to navigate these challenging

and uncomfortable conversations. And Judaism is here to support our community, reminding us that even though we have never experienced this before, our ancestors have laid out a plan for how we can best navigate the unknown.

We can't protect our children from the world. But we can ensure that they know that as they navigate the world, they are never truly alone.


