Choosing Life, Again

Every year, as we conclude the book of Deuteronomy and read the Torah on *Yom Kippur* morning, we confront the choices that God gives to us. The idea of selecting between blessing and curse, life and death, culminates in the commandment to "choose life, that you and your offspring might live." This is not a political statement, and has literally nothing to do with anything to do with abortion. Rather, it is a commandment to exercise free will to seek blessing and not curse, for that is the way to a life worth living.

We all know people who have a terrible outlook on life. Their choice to seek a couple that is more than half empty is a way to seek the curse and not the blessing. The seat I have as a rabbi watching the lives of so many has taught me that everybody has tragedy in their lives. Everyone has bad times. But bad times do not need to be curses. Similarly, I know some affluent people who have found success--even riches in professional endeavors who are bereft of joy, and unable to count their blessings.

Our tradition teaches us the need to choose a path toward righteousness, blessing, and--yes--life. Perhaps the phrase in Deuteronomy should be, "...therefore, choose a life worth living." When I was a kid, my mother, father, and my brothers and I were in the Friday night receiving line to wish our rabbis a *Shabbat Shalom*. One of the older rabbis looked at my mother and our family and said to her, "you are a very rich woman." She never forgot how important that phrase was. Our family was not affluent (to say the least), and frequently felt like the entire *shul* was filled with fur coats. However, my mother knew what our rabbi meant: She had good guys in her life, and we all knew how to be a family. What blessing is better than that?

As we begin our High Holy Day period, it is time for selfexamination. Where has our perspective been? How have we contributed to the world's problems, and where have we acted to undermine society's curses? When have we done the right thing—not because others were watching—but because it was the right thing to do? How is our outlook shaped toward choosing life and blessing--and when do we default to curse?

I look forward to greeting you during our holidays—and working together to pray for absolution from vows meant sincerely but not kept anyway, forgiveness from unintentional sins, and awareness of times we fell short. And as we do, let us seek to double down on our efforts to acknowledge that we daily face choices surrounding good and evil, but that the command is to choose life and blessing--that we all might live a life worth living.
