JEWISH VIEWS OF WITH RABBI DR. HAIM O. RECHNITZER THE AFTERLIFE

Rabbi Dr. Haim O. Rechnitzer is a Professor of Jewish Thought at HUC-JIR in Cincinnati, Ohio, and a poet. He earned his doctorate at the Hebrew University of Jerusalem and his rabbinical ordination from HUC-JIR (Jerusalem) in 2003. His research is dedicated to themes of political theology, theological trends in Hebrew poetry, Israeli theology, and Jewish education. Previously, Rabbi Dr. Rechnitzer taught in several academic institutions in Israel and was on the faculty of the Franklin and Marshall College (PA).







From the Rabbi Sandford R. Kopnick

HOW TO THINK ABOUT THIS MOMENT:

Right before the new year began, we received an email that threatened us. We called the police, evacuated the building, and prayed that it was a false alarm. It was. Synagogues and other Jewish institutions throughout the country all received the same email. It happened one more time, and we were advised to keep calm, others had received it, too—another false alarm.

The events of October 7 and the Israeli response has promoted a sharp increase in anti-Semitism. I hosted a lunch with a bunch of our college kids during the winter-break to check-in, and heard about the myriad of ways our students are impacted by the attitudes of their friends and college communities. It is difficult to understand where compassion for residents of Gaza, loyalty to the Jewish people, and a sense of personal safety can coexist in one person. Our college students are not the only people trying to navigate this moment.

This history of our people is familiar with anti-Semitism even in societies in which we've found ourselves to be welcomed and assimilated. It is true that many of us are too young to remember the last time there was this much anti-Jewish and anti-Israel talk. It has been a long time since anti-Semitism has been this publicly discussed and so easily perpetrated.

There are a few things to remember:

- 1. It is OK for us to be critical of Israel without losing our sense of loyalty. We are Jews. Family matters—and Israel is family. Families disagree and even disapprove. And sometimes, hopefully often, family looks closer at the behaviors to be sure that we understand what motivates our brethren without relying on hearsay and uninformed news reports.
- 2. It is important to connect with each other and our sense of community. Attending services, adult ed, and other opportunities can give us all a sense of security and calm. We are not alone and we need each other. I need you, too.
- 3. The Jewish Federation and the Jewish Community Relations Council are doing wonderful work on our behalf. There is a subsidiary of the Federation called Safe Cincinnati which initiated an Ohio network to keep track of threats and incidents. We are frequently briefed and we all are benefiting from this system.

- 4. Engaging in arguments about the Israeli response to the October massacre does not help. Reading reliable information does. I've been very impressed by Thomas Friedman of the *New York Times* and his perspectives. If you post anything, post a link to a verified reliable source. Do not respond to posts. Instead, be sure that you and your circle are informed appropriately, and use the tools available to us to be sure we are safe.
- 5. Check in. let me or Rabbi Zoot know what you need—and let us help.

These are tougher times than we imagined were likely in a post-holocaust world. And yet, here we are. We are still commanded "to remember the strangers, for we were strangers in the land of Egypt," and that "all of the Jewish people are responsible one for the other." May God bring the fighting in the middle east to an end. May God inspire peace rather than conflict, love rather than hate. And may Am Yisrael Chai—the Jewish people live. I hope to see you soon!

Rabbi/Educator's Message **Austin Zoot**

Across North America, there has been a large push to see mid-week Hebrew School transitioned online. There are a few obvious logistical reasons why many communities have found this to be a helpful adjustment, flexibility chief among them. Online Hebrew learning could, many believe, save people time and energy, and perhaps even cut down on absences.

But anyone who has proposed these kinds of changes hasn't spent enough time at Valley Temple on a Tuesday night. Because from 6:30 to 7:30 every week, there is an incredibly special feeling that fills the building. In the half-hour leading up to class beginning, learners of all ages arrive and schmooze and eat the candy that I provide (I am not above bribing people to enjoy being at Temple...) After the first two days of the week, there is something beautifully cathartic about being able to come into shared space and feel the warmth of community, the reminder that while the rest of the world has all kinds of expectations and obligations of us, for this one hour we get to come together and enjoy the simple joy of learning as a family.

As the Director of Education, I am ironically one of the only people in the building who ISN'T in class on a Tuesday night. Which means I get the chance to walk around to each of the classrooms and hear the beautiful sound of conversation, prayer, study, and text, all intersecting as people gain access to the language that has underwritten our people for millennia. From 4th graders learning the foundational building block letters to adults advancing into the depths of our textual tradition, there is a place for every learner at every level on Tuesday night. Anyone who wants to find a way to explore Judaism more deeply can find a speed that works for them.

Because at the end of the day, it is vital that we remember that we are not simply teaching language skills. Sure, Duolingo might be able to teach practical

linguistics more efficiently and effectively than we can. But we are not in the business of passing tests or hitting arbitrary milestones. Instead, we continue to create learning environments where we put people at the center of what we do, where the connections we forge and the intimacy we facilitate is essential to the entire process. None of this The Valley Temple ושבנתם כבניך

can be done nearly as well nor as meaningfully as it can in face-to-face interaction.

In the 18th century, there was fear that Hebrew would become a dead language. It wasn't until Eliezer Ben-Yehuda came along and revitalized what we know as modern Hebrew that we were able to reconnect with the structures that had lifted up our people for thousands of years before. And every Tuesday night, I'm reminded of just what it means to be a living language: a one that conveys the values of a people, that helps us better understand one another and ourselves. On Tuesday nights, our congregation comes together to join in the ancient practice of learning our shared tongue, and in so doing continue to remember what it means to sustain ourselves on the sweetness of Torah. Because sometimes the studying of words is about something so much more important than letters on the page.

BLUE BIN DONATIONS

February 2024: Bethany House Services

Bethany House Services (BHS) provides comprehensive family-centered homelessness services, all of which are provided by staff trained in trauma-informed care and focused on empowering families to reach self-sufficiency.

BHS has addressed the precedented need for homeless services due to the pandemic and the economy. Their new facility can serve up to 43 families and 220 individuals at one time.

To help them settle families into stable housing, the following bathroom and cleaning items are requested for our "Blue Bin" donations for February:

Towels (hand/face/body), cleaning products, bathroom waste basket, paper towels, shower curtain sets, dish washing supplies, laundry detergents.

For these and other donations throughout the year, if delivering to the temple is not convenient, you can send a check to the Valley Temple Social Action fund and we will make sure it goes to the designated agency, or order items through Amazon and have it delivered to the temple.

Our Tikkun Olam committee has ideas for the other months of the year, including climate change actions, LGBTQ+ rights, and others, but we'd love to have more people join us, and bring your ideas and passions!

SOCIAL JUSTICE ACTIVITIES

We work closely with RAC-OH throughout the year, to coordinate advocacy activities, such as letter-writing, calling on legislators, and education related to public policies that have been identified by the Union of Reform Judaism (URJ) and local congregations. While we are gratified that our many months of hard work by us and our coalition partners helped insure the passage of Issue 1 in Ohio. But there are clearly many more struggles ahead, both nationally and in the world, including Israel's war against Hamas, and the rising antisemitism in the US. Getting out the vote in 2024 will be crucial to all these endeavors.

The Reform Jewish Movement's 2024 Every Voice, Every Vote Campaign will be launching soon. Held every two years, the campaign is a nonpartisan effort, grounded in our Jewish values and commitment to racial justice, to strengthen our democracy by encouraging and protecting voter participation. The 2022 campaign resulted in a record level of voter engagement in which the Reform Movement mobilized to reach out to over 650,000 voters, and we expect to exceed our goals in 2024.
