PURIM DURING THE GAZA WAR

Yes, we're going to have a Purim Schpiel. Yet, writing our spoof with this year's theme seemed more difficult than usual. With the rise of anti-Semitism, and especially the aggressive criticism of Israel—the idea of writing in Haman's voice is even more distasteful.

Throughout my life, anti-Semites have been fringe and generally a minority with an opinion that does not resonate among mainstream Americans. The last seven or eight years has seen the rise of anti-Semitism to alarming rates. Furthermore, the Israeli response to the *Hamas* driven Israeli massacre and kidnappings has created must stronger opinions. Israel is being likened to the worst actors of historical events—Haman, if you will.

I am not among those. While I wish to God that *Hamas* did not put so many Palestinians into harm's way in Gaza, *Hamas* cannot expect anything less than a ferocious response to October 7. Furthermore, the world's powers would never ever respond differently. After 9-11, the U.S. entered a 20-year war. You and I both know that much of the criticism of the Israelis is because they are Jews, not because they are unjustified in neutralizing the target even though it hides behind civilians in hospitals.

So, this year, we will again celebrate the victory of Esther and Mordecai over the evil Haman. We will remember that changing just one letter of Haman—we find the word *Hamas*. Sadly, both had/have similar goals. We will bring our Jewish senses of humor to our celebration with hopes that for an evening, we can celebrate our people's unique will to survive—even when asked to do difficult things in order to accomplish the task.

And then, we will begin the road to Passover, when we remember that we were strangers in the land of Egypt, and that we're not the only ones who have ever prayed for release and redemption. But until then, bring on the carnival, the schpiel, and the hamantashen. And let's pray that all peoples will find peace enough to relegate stories of winning over oppression to history once and for all.

Rabbi/Educator's Message Austin Zoot



Every month or so, the Education Directors from the various synagogues get together to talk about the great and the challenging parts about our jobs. We share best practices, make suggestions, and generally keep one another informed as to what is happening in other communities throughout the city. Considering we have such similarly aligned goals, it is a nice chance to have a collegial relationship with others and to allow a rising tide in Cincinnati to raise all of our boats.

During our most recent meeting, one of my peers noted that she is seeing more behavioral challenges than she has ever encountered in her career. There was a chorus of agreement; over the past few years, we are seeing students struggle more than many of us can remember to remain focused, to behave with kindness, and to "fit in" to school culture. It seems that, in the wake of the pandemic, none of us are spared from the deeply damaging social implications of isolation, tumult, and strain.

Valley is certainly not exempt from encountering our fair share of, shall we say, behavioral complications. Any time we try to encourage children to learn we are, at some level, asking them to stretch their creativity and patience in a way that can be difficult, especially as a supplementary program after a whole week of concentration and learning in the secular school world. We are, then, tasked with figuring out how to do good, meaningful Jewish learning in a way that feels like an invitation, like an opportunity, rather than a burden or a restriction.

Our first priority is always health and safety. And our next priority is the cognitive and emotional well-being of our students. We, as a school, are less concerned with whether or not the students can pass a test that we have no intention of giving them. Instead, our ultimate goal is to create an environment in which each student can feel intellectually safe. A student who is in fear of reprimand and punishment is not going to engage with Judaism from a place of love. Fear is a terrible motivator for religious engagement, as recent history has made abundantly clear. Instead, we constantly strive to create a culture in which students know that they can have big feelings, that they can do hard things, that they can see challenges and know that their rabbi, teacher, and community is there to support them.



"The Principal's Office" is where we keep the candy and the dad jokes. Sure, some students need to come to my office to find a sense of calm, to recalibrate after something made them feel uncentered. There are, of course, times when a child needs to be able to process their feelings without being a distraction to other students. But it is our ultimate goal that no child will ever leave the Valley Temple believing that they are a "problem." Instead, we strive to ensure that every student goes home knowing they are cherished, respected, and cared for, even when they are in need of some assistance and guidance. Because at the end of the day, isn't that what we all need? A place to figure out how to be a person in safety and peace.

Together we will read and uncover the relevance these stories and the historical moment they portray have to our lives!


The Advocate, The Poet, and the Man: Abraham Joshua Heschel's Legacy During a Period of Jewish Upheaval

The middle of the 20th Century was one of the most dynamic and challenging periods in Jewish history. In the aftermath of the Holocaust, the worldwide Jewish community was tasked with figuring out how to balance our Jewish identities with our civic responsibilities and moral theologies. Few had a greater impact on that process than Abraham Joshua Heschel Through his theology, his social activism and his extensive writings, Heschel helped to set the focus for global Jewish perspectives even to this day. We will explore the ways that Heschel has echoed through recent Jewish history and what he has to teach us during our own moments of ideological transition.

In this comprehensive approach to Jewish humor focused on the relationship between humor and American Jewish practice, Jennifer Caplan calls us to adopt a more expansive view of what it means to "do Jewish," revealing that American Jews have turned, and continue to turn, to humor as a cultural touchstone. Caplan frames the book around four generations of Jewish Americans from the Silent Generation to Millennials, highlighting a shift from the utilization of Jewish-specific markers to American-specific markers.
